

FAMILIAR TERRITORY

SEVENTEEN YEARS AGO, JOHN AND DORIS SULLIVAN ENLISTED THE HELP OF CAROLYN MCCARTHY, OF INTERIORS NONPAREIL, TO FASHION THE INSIDE OF THEIR CORAL GABLES HOME. But the successful collaboration was just a stopping point until the owners would one day move to their dream waterfront location and again draw on the Coral Gables designer's creative prowess. "Carolyn was such a great designer and so helpful to us then that I told her, 'When we get that property on the water, you're gonna be it,'" Doris recalls.

The property the couple eventually acquired was situated on a waterway leading into Biscayne Bay, and, before McCarthy could work her magic, architectural design plans needed to get underway. She worked with Miami-based architect Ramon Pacheco, of Ramon Pacheco & Associates, Architect and Planner, from the onset to give the house functionality and finesse. Pacheco designed a classical Mediterranean house that operates on several axes, the main one running from the front entrance to the rear exterior, overlooking the waterway. "The goal was to accommodate the owners' request for as many rooms

a possible facing the water," Pacheco says, "and to make the house work with all the spaces they wanted." The L-shaped house is designed so that the owners can conveniently access the core rooms, with the family room and adjacent kitchen/breakfast area, upstairs master bedroom and 3,000-bottle wine cellar—collecting is a hobby of John's—in the same wing.

McCarthy imbued the interiors with an inviting ambiance that speaks to the owners' bustling family life, love of the outdoors and penchant for entertaining. To create a transitional scheme, McCarthy repurposed some of the owners' furnishings and searched for new pieces and antiques

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that had clean lines and an elegant appeal without being too formal. In some cases, she made oversized Styrofoam models so the owners could understand the volume of space they were trying to fill. "If we couldn't find the right piece, we'd wait until it revealed itself to us; we only bought things that we were truly happy and excited about," McCarthy says. "This takes time and patience but, in the end, is so worth it. You don't tire of things that you're truly attached to. To me, that is what makes a timeless interior."

Each room contains one item that served as the catalyst for the design in that space, starting with the living room area rug from Woven Rug Specialist that McCarthy and the owners instantly fell for. Soft, understated shades of blue, cream and beige give the large-scaled residence a humbling warmth; this palette echoes in the contemporary art that juxtaposes against the traditional furnishings. "In South Florida," McCarthy says, "we have such a riot of color outside that I don't want the

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interiors to compete with the views.”

Because these views played such a large role in the design of the Sullivan home, landscape designers Jorge Sanchez and Phil Maddux, and project manager Brian Vertesch, of Palm Beach’s Sanchez & Maddux, treaded lightly when designing the landscape, keeping architectural plantings close to the house and jungle-like tropical materials farther away. “We’re an extension of the interiors and architecture of the house,” Sanchez says. “It’s important that we don’t come up with something contrary to that.” An elevated main terrace allows the owners to soak in the canal views, and a walk down a Dominican shell-stone stairway leads to another water

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pool flush with the green grass around it. “The inside of the house transitions through the covered terraces seamlessly, allowing the owners to benefit from all the different areas,” says home builder Jose C. Mendiola Jr., president of Jomed Construction Corporation in Miami, who credits the entire design team for making the house and gardens feel as one.

McCarthy and the Sullivans predicted they’d work well together. After knowing one another for so long, McCarthy says she instinctively sensed what the owners would like and what they wouldn’t. But, with the way the architect, builder and landscape architects joined in their choreographed dance, as McCarthy calls it, without missing a step, one could easily mistake them all for old friends. **L**
